CLUB FACILITY NEWS

There continues to be exciting progress with our Vision 2020. We have partnered with the Friends of the Bowl (FOB), a not-for-profit, fundraising organization that is developing a year-round, multi-sport complex in the Gordie Howe Management Area of our City.

We are in the process of formulating a 5-year plan to submit to the FOB and subsequently to the City of Saskatoon.

It looks like we will have a facility that will be shared with the baseball folks. SNSC in winter; baseball in summer. We will have lighted ski areas for classic as well as skate skiing. There will be a warm-up building with bathrooms, change rooms, kitchenette, canteen, waxing room and much more. We hope for a storage area for grooming equipment, possibly even heated.

We are negotiating for many kilometres of groomed trails, with all kinds of terrain for novice to advanced skiers. Since the youth, school and competitive programs are an important part of our Club, we are working to accommodate terrain that will maximize the skiing experience for each of

these, as well as our recreational skiers that like more and less skiing challenges.


We will be sharing the grooming of this area with the City groomers starting this coming season (2017-18). It is our plan to move our youth programs to the area in 2018-19.

Ski At School

SNSC will offer Ski At School for a third season. This program is offered to grade 4, 5 and 6 students in the Saskatoon elementary school systems and to home school groups. The program provides all equipment and a two hour *introduction to cross country skiing session* with 2 experienced, certified instructors. Groups are responsible for their own

transportation to and from Wildwood Golf Course ski trails and are charged a \$30 fee per group.

This program is a truly joint offering. It is supported by Cross Country Canada, Cross Country Saskatchewan, The Saskatoon Nordic Ski Club, The City of Saskatoon, Eb's Source For Adventure and Mountain Equipment Coop. We inform the public and separate systems when registration is open. If you are not part of these systems but would like to be invited to register contact skiatschool@ saskatoonnordicski.ca and you will be included in the notification. We have filled up the 80 spaces in 2 days in the past so please choose, in advance, 3 possible dates and whether you want an AM or PM session. The program runs on all days school is in session in January, February and up until March 14th.

EB'S TRAILS NEWS by Randy Chapman

All trails have been scouted for the season. Deadfall has been removed from all sections accessible to motorized vehicles. Hand scything and deadfall removal on sections between flooded areas must still be done. The water bodies have much deadfall showing and this will be cleared after the ice is thick enough to support workers.

Mowing will begin by mid September.

Many of the signs and maps at junctions are missing or need repair. We need help with this if someone wishes to take on the responsibility. Plans are in place for some maintenance work at the shelters and for wood cutting and gathering for the stoves.

The steep hill and out-run near the end of the Lookout Ridge trail, which have been blocked since 2010, have been opened. Both the hill and bypass should be groomed this season.

Prior to 2015 the accounting practice of the Saskatoon Nordic Ski Club was to fully expense capital purchases in the year of purchase. Therefore capital assets have not shown on the balance sheet previous to June 30, 2016.

At the 2015 Annual General Meeting the Executive was asked to look into the possibility of showing capital assets on the SNSC Balance Sheet. The Executive decided to not add equipment purchased in previous years to the balance sheet as this would essentially change the financial statements for numerous years that have previously been accepted by the membership.

The Executive decided to start showing new purchases of capital assets on the balance sheet beginning in 2015-16.
